

CHURCH HISTORY

Trinity History Bites

Part 2 of a Trinity History Series

The "St. Andrew's Satellite" becomes a Formal Congregation

You may have noticed the display in our Karl English lounge related to the Growth of Life Together with God in St. Andrew's "satellite congregation" from 1983 through to 1986. The materials in that portion of the historical display are courtesy of Kathy Slimmon and her daughter Kerrie, who lovingly prepared a photo album which preserves the history of Trinity Presbyterian Church, Calgary. Both the predecessor satellite church (which was highlighted in Part 1 – June/July 2024 ConnXions) and Trinity Presbyterian Church, Calgary are essential components in the history of St. Andrew's Calgary which we know and love today.

The following summary from the photo album described above gives you an interesting overview of developments in the life of Trinity Presbyterian Church, Calgary.

January 31st, 1988

The Presbytery of Calgary- Macleod met at the Midnapore Elementary School for the purpose of establishing the new congregation of Trinity Presbyterian Church. The act of erection of a congregation was conducted by Rev. Dr. Frank Breisch. The Rev. Stephen Kendall received 10 members by Profession of Faith and 52 by Transfer of Certificate.

Spring 1990

Construction began on the new building for Trinity.

December 1990

The congregation of Trinity moved into the new building at 400 Midpark Blvd., SE, Calgary.

January 1991

The building was dedicated by the Presbytery of Calgary-Macleod at a special service attended by approximately 250 people. The Session comprised: Teaching Elder-Stephen Kendall; Ruling Elders- Betty Baxter (Clerk), Jacqueline Fox, Malcolm Roberts, Linda MacLean, Ian Laird, Ian Denness and Greg Lippitt.

July 1991

The Rev. Stephen Kendall resigned and moved back to Toronto, Ontario.

February 1992

Duncan Colquhoun (and his wife, Delaina), was appointed as minister to Trinity.

June 1993 to July 1994

Trinity was served by Rev. Karl English (as Interim-Moderator) and Reverends Carl DeLine and Gordon Cunningham as Interim Ministers.

July 1994

The Reverend Robert (Bob) Cruickshank (and his wife, Joan) appointed Minister.

May 1997

The Rev. Bob Cruickshank was reappointed without term on a request from the congregation at a called Congregational Meeting, chaired by the Reverend Gordon Firth.

September 1999

The Sanctuary has been enlarged by removing the "Mothers' Room" and relocating it to the Nursery Room across from St. Andrew's Hall. This gives an extra 40 seats in the Sanctuary. Session is now comprised of 12 Elders: Betty Baxter, Joyce Bodie Bell (Clerk), Leonard Bradley, Doris Davis, John Kenney, Agnes Kopfensteiner, Barbara McKeever, John McPhee, Malcolm Roberts, Ronald Smith, Priscilla Towers and Stan Wrobleski.

September 1999

The Reverend Robert Cruikshank served as Moderator for the Presbytery of Calgary-Macleod.

December 2001

The church received an organ and the choir music library (as well as 103 stacking chairs) from Chalmers Presbyterian Church, Calgary which had closed in June of that year. The choir now sat in diagonal rows with the Communion table in the middle. As well, Trinity was given a gift from the proceeds of sale of Chalmers which went toward debt reduction. Ordination of new Elders added four to session which is now comprised of 15 elders: Betty Baxter, Joyce Bodie Bell, Leonard Bradley, Barbara Brown, Doris Davis, Nora Finley, Douglas Hardie, Merle Kirkpatrick, Agnes Kopfensteiner, John McPhee, Judy Roberts, Malcolm Roberts, Ronald Smith, Priscilla Towers, and Stan Wrobleski.

January 2011

In 2011, Trinity Presbyterian Church, Calgary and St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Calgary merged into our present congregation. The new amalgamation was committed to a renewed focus of ministry to families in the "South of Fish Creek" area. In addition to the naming of Trinity Hall downstairs, evidence of Trinity Church as part of our history can be found in the Chancel area and the stained glass in the Foyer above the Sanctuary doors.



The Power of Showing Up

Thirteen years ago, I found myself at the Calgary Pride Parade for the first time. I left my 5 month-old son at home with my husband, and joined with other teachers to walk in the Pride Parade with the Calgary Public Teachers banner. This was the first time that teachers had walked together under our ATA local banner in the Pride parade, and it was important for us to show support for our colleagues and students. As a high school teacher, I could see the daily wear on my students and colleagues who silenced parts of their identity in order to keep themselves safe at work and school. It was important for me to use my privilege of being a cis-gendered heterosexual woman to stand up for the right of my colleagues to talk about their same-sex partners as freely as I could talk about my husband. It was important for me to stand up for my students who just wanted a safe place to eat their lunch, free from the glares and comments of their peers. It was for these very simple but powerful daily moments that I walked in the Pride parade with the hope that as our son's identity revealed itself as he grew older, he and his friends could live in a friendlier world than the one he was born into. I was surrounded by my colleagues that day, feeling the strength of our community in standing for what we valued.

As we walked along the parade route, It was such a joyful, rainbow themed party, and such a contrast from the isolation that we felt as 2-3 people within a school trying to support our students. I was feeling uplifted by the power of community that day.

Half way through the parade route, I caught sight of something that brought me to tears. It was a message that was created just for me.

My husband surprised me and came to the Pride Parade with our son. There they both were, standing on the street corner with a huge rainbow-colored poster that read "My name is Josh, and I am proud of my mom who supports ALL students". I was undone - the tears started flowing as I felt the incredible support of my family who showed up for me.

That is the power of the Pride parade. It's about showing up for people.

Jesus' ministry took place in the streets, in the marketplace, in private homes, and sometimes, even in places of worship. Here at St. Andrew's, we are actively pursuing ways that we can Grow Life Together with God and be "woven into the neighborhood". That's why a number of us from St. Andrew's Rainbow Team were in attendance at this year's Pride Parade in downtown Calgary on Sunday, September 1, 2024. The Pride parade is a yearly event in Calgary, and in many major cities across Canada, as a way to support and uplift the 2SLGBTQIA (Two-spirit, lesbian, gay, bi-sexual, transgender, queer, intersex and allies) community who have been throughout history, and in many ways continue to be silenced, ignored, ostracized, undersupported, ridiculed, and even targeted.

What could be more uplifting than adults and children dressed in rainbow colors, dancing, singing, walking dogs and blowing bubbles as a way to celebrate the many different and beautiful ways that we live in the world? As a team from St. Andrew's, we were quietly taking note of how other faith communities identified themselves as they walked in the parade. The messages of "God is Love" and "God loves everyone" may seem simple, and yet we know that not all Christian denominations are prepared to affirm the identity of 2SLGBTQIA people, and that for many 2SLGBTQIA people, church has been a place of pain and rejection because of their sexual orientation or gender identity. Christian spaces can be unsafe and hostile places as biblical passages have been, and continue to be used to condemn 2SLGBTQIA people.

There is power in our words. There is power in showing up.

For all the people who have been wondering if they are loved.

For all the people who have been wondering if they belong within the church.

It is important for us as a community to publicly, intentionally, explicitly state for all those who are wondering, that God loves ALL people.

God loves people who are two-spirited God loves people who are lesbian God loves people who are gay God loves people who are bi-sexual God loves people who are pan-sexual God loves people who are transgender God loves people who are cisgender God loves people who are queer God loves people who are intersex God loves people who are allies God loves ALL people. Every one.
